How to Claim your Callsign Subdomain



What you will Need

- Create an account
- Have your email verified
- Finish Setting Setup an individual amateur radio account
- Have your callsign verified
 - Under “**Account**” menu, select “**Call signs**” and follow prompts
 - An Administrator will verify your callsign.
 - Please allow some time for an Admin to Verify your callsign.

Claim your CallSign Domain Name

Log into your Portal Account

- Select the “DNS” from top menu drop down bar
- Select “My subdomains”
- Select “Request a subdomain”

Claim your CallSign Domain Name



When choosing a subdomain the preferred format is callsign.ampr.org where 'callsign' is one of your verified call signs. If you have not verified your call sign yet, please select 'Call signs' from the 'Accounts' menu and click 'Verify' against the call sign. Once your call sign has been verified come back here and request the subdomain and it will be automatically approved. If you try and request a subdomain for a call sign that has not been verified, or you request a subdomain that does not consist of your call sign then this form will open a ticket asking an administrator to review your request. Please note that administrator review will increase the time for activating your subdomain.

Claim your CallSign Domain Name

- If you already had a callsign subdomain in the ampr.org DNS domain this will bring all those DNS records over to your account
- If you don't have records already, it will create the new callsign subdomain. Example: **qz9abc.ampr.org**
